




Context and Objectives

In the context of antibacterial resistance, finding new antibacterial molecules is an urgent need. The high potential of fungi to produce bioactive metabolites is well known, especially for Ascomycota (Aspergillii, Fusarium sp., Xylaria sp., ...). However, the few studies done with Basidiomycota (Agaricus sp., Fomes sp., Pleurotus sp., ...) were always based on sporophores (and mainly from Ganoderma species) harvests and extractions. This is a bottleneck for original metabolites discoveries and pressure environmental resources. In this purpose, we stressed Basidiomycota to trigger the production of secondary metabolites with potential antibacterial activities with a focus on fungal Antimicrobial Peptides (f-AMP). Indeed, genomic organization of f-AMP are not well known, and targeted and/or in silico studies are not efficient requiring the use of a non-targeted approach.


Briefly, after a prescreening of 80 fungal strains, we focused on the <10kDa fraction containing f-AMP of fungal secretomes from 20 strains to evaluate their antibacterial properties.





Results and Discussion

1. Pre-screening : 80 fungal strains in agar coculture with E. coli.



A) No observable modifications

B) Thicker mycelium

C) Bacterial inhibition

5/17 genuses showed antibacterial activities 32/80 fungal strains with antibacterial activities

2. Production of secretomes and Evaluation – global results

Cheap, efficient, and fast method to screen antibacterial activities from Basidiomycota



Strains 11 and 12 showed the best antibacterial activity on both *E. coli* and *E. faecalis*. The metabolomic analysis showed an unknown molecule in Strain 11 (purification ongoing...)

Strains 14 and 15 were selected as 'negative control'.

Strains 16 and 17 were antibacterial in agar coculture (with *E.* coli) but not with classical approach. It is possible that the metabolite is > 10 kDa.

Antibacterial activity confirmed (except for 2 strains)

Promising data on Strain 11

Conclusions

- 1. The agar coculture method is cheap, fast, and efficient to reveal new antibacterial activities from Basidiomycota.
- 2. The antibacterial activity highlighted with agar coculture is confirmed with classical approach for 16/18 secretomes.
 - 3. Mycelium-based screening is relevant to mine new antibacterial activities from Basidiomycota.
- 4. With 40% of antibacterial strains among the 80 tested strains, Basidiomycota is a highly promising reservoir for new antibacterial activities.

Perspectives

- 1. Test the protease-treated fraction of the secretomes,
 - 2. Identify the antibacterial compounds.
